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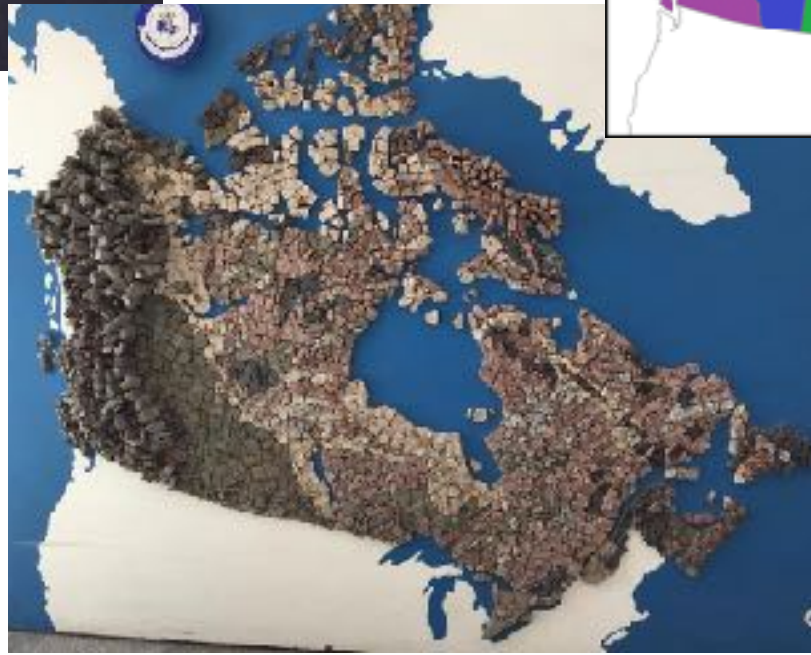

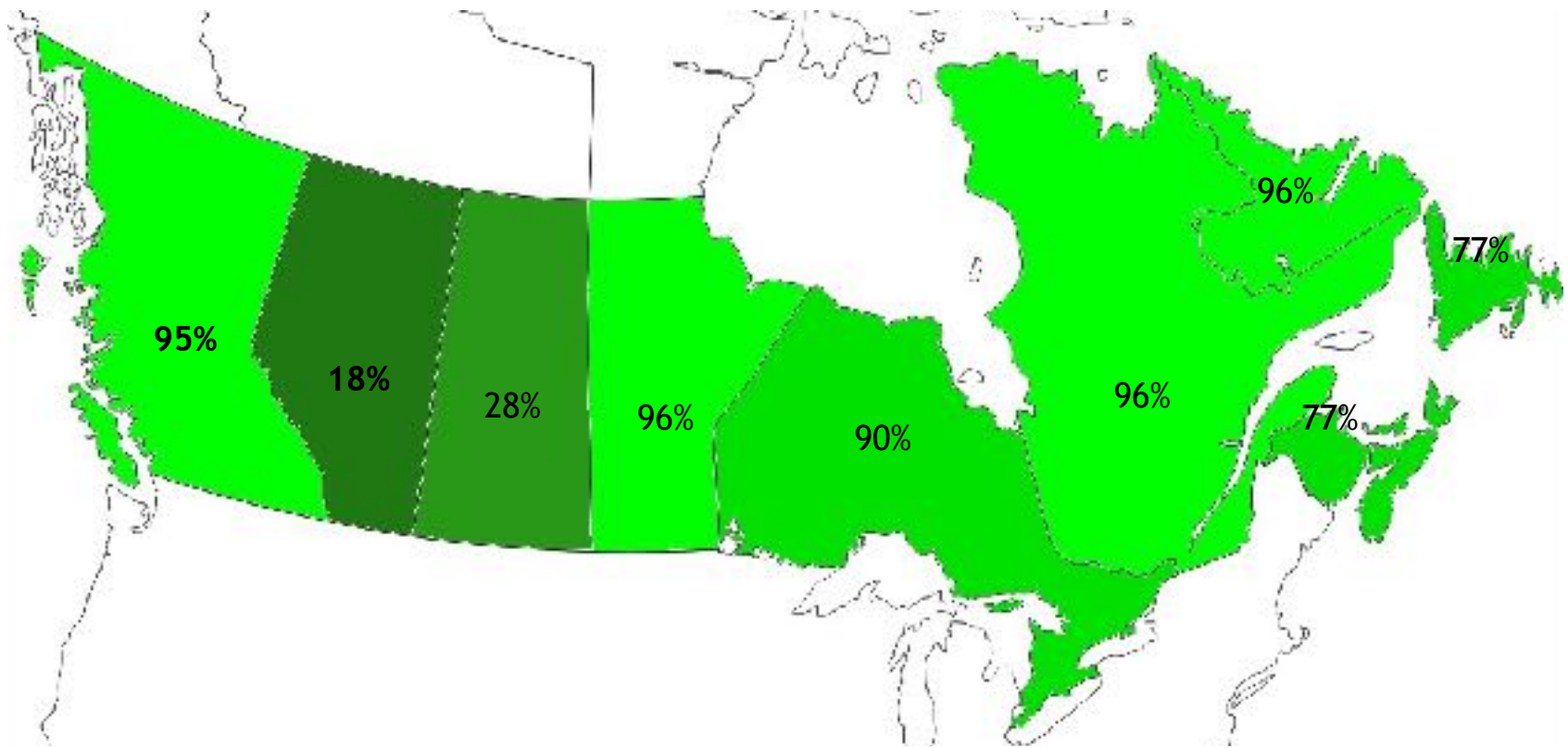

The Canadian Constitution identifies jurisdiction

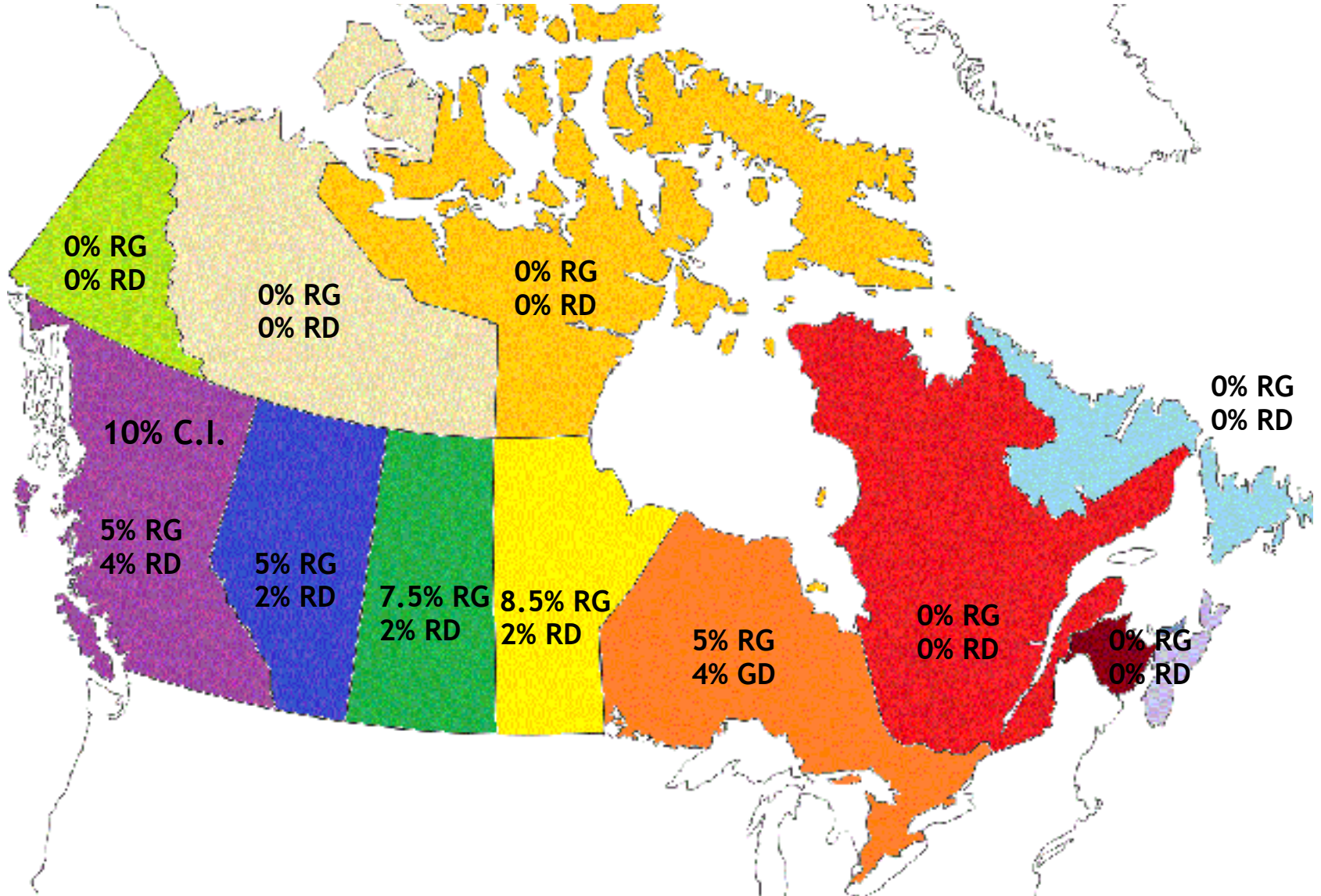
- Energy jurisdiction is shared between the federal and provincial governments. The provinces are owners of their ground resources except for those in Aboriginal and federal lands.
- The provinces are responsible for energy matters relating to economic and energy security within their borders. Provinces may impose royalties and taxes on energy production.



Provincial reasons for regulating fuel

- It is a provincial responsibility and a right
- Economic development
- Price control
- Air quality
- Greenhouse Gas reductions

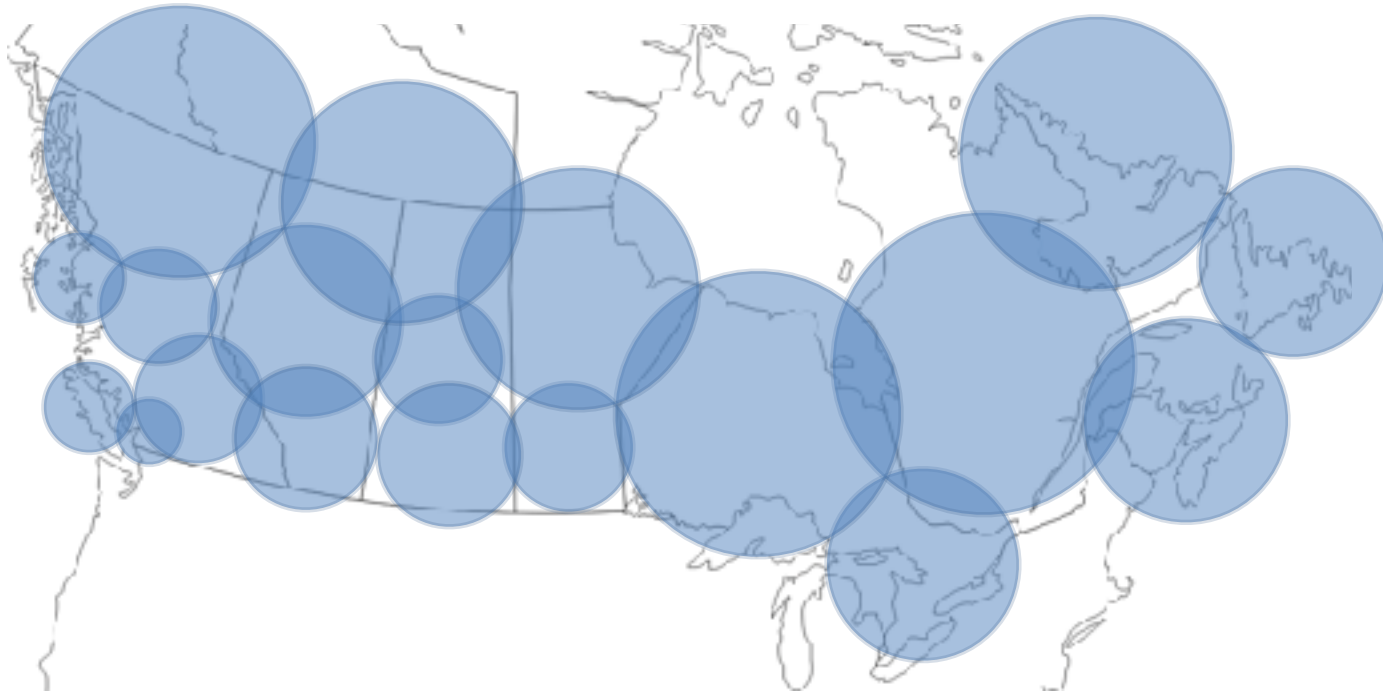
All of these reasons are valid, but the relative importance is different for each province or territory.





Fuel is distributed through a system of primary and secondary terminals that determine a supply “orbit.”

When biofuel is blended at these terminals, all customers in that orbit receive a uniform product.
